## The Problem

Public participation is hardly referred to in industrial decarbonisation roadmaps, and current engagement practices are lacking

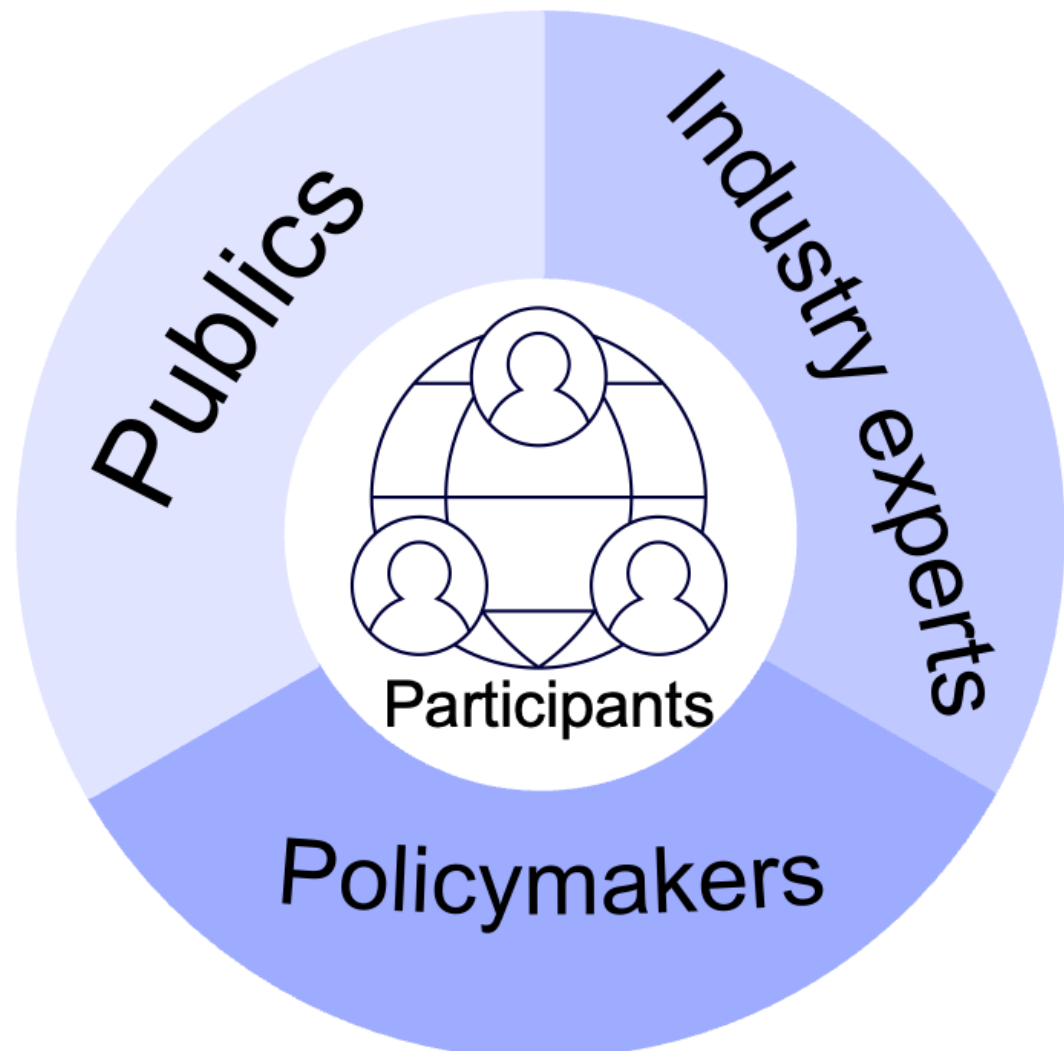
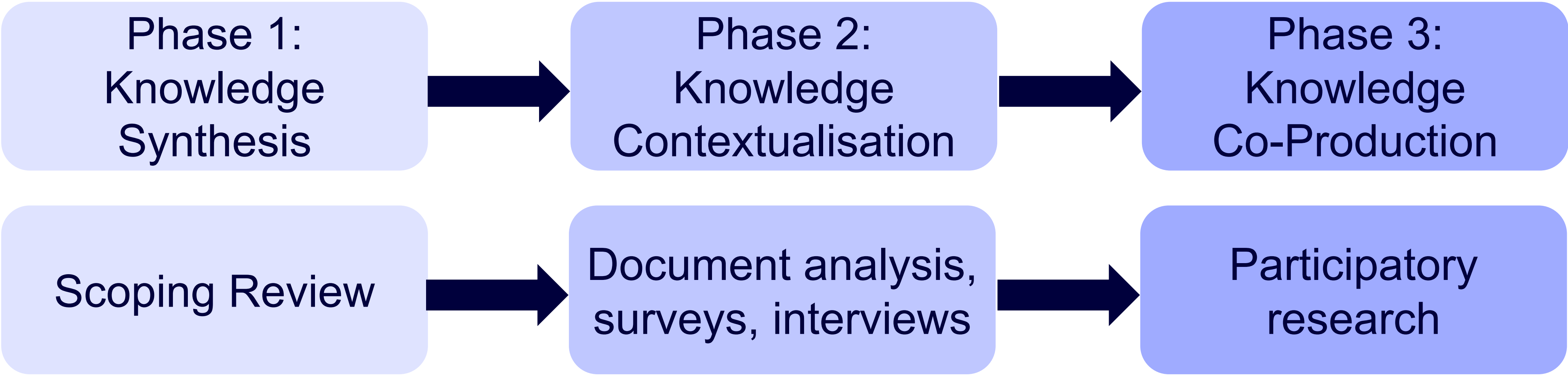
## Aims

## Initial Results: Phase 1

Who? Local communities, marginalised groups, workers

How? Consultation surveys, workshops, deliberative mini-publics

Just process (procedure) and outcomes (distribution) core concerns

## Impact

Give voice to marginalised groups, who are under-represented in climate discourse

Inform the design of effective and equitable engagement strategies

Increase legitimacy, and ultimately a social licence to operate
